### ADS Region 6 Director's Report By Bill Walker

The Board and staff are in full swing in preparation for the upcoming 2024

ADS National Convention, June 12-15, in Oklahoma City. Significant planning is in process for the 2025 ADS National Convention in Seattle (first time visit for the Convention to Seattle). Registrations are still open for Oklahoma City, but less than 100 places remain. A second convention hotel has been added as well. Full registration is \$339, youth registration is free, and there is an excellent optional tour to the Myriad Botanical Gardens and First Americans Museum for \$90 on Thursday. The gardens visited will include the Will Rogers, Topguns, Jindra, Reusser, Kowalchyk, and Windswept Daylily Gardens. Last Fall I visited the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum in OKC and it was fantastic. Of course, I have a thing for End of the Trail sculpture, the Taos Society of Artists collection like Blumenschein, Sharp, Phillips, Couse, and Dunton, and the Western Saddles collection.

Register and make hotel reservations for the 2024 National Convention in Oklahoma City at https:// <u>www.ads2024convention.org/#/</u>. Registration includes lunches in the gardens and banquets, live auctions, silent auctions, judge training and recertification sessions, and terrific camaraderie and bonhomie.

As I discussed last time, the Society has transitioned from Past-President Scott Elliott to President Rhonda Veroeven. A significant reshuffling of Committee assignments took place, and I have been selected to chair the Marketing Committee and Special Projects Committee.

President Veroeven also announced that she and other ADS officials plan to make an official visit to Region 6 in 2024. I've no further information on this but will keep the President of Region 6 advised of the planning.

Cultivar awards were announced and can be found at <u>https://daylilies.org/daylilies/awards/</u> and include the Stout Silver Medal won by Scott Elliott for *H*. **'Tim Herring-ton'**, the Lenington All-American Award for Bishop's *H*. **'Itsy Bitsy Spider'**, and all the other winners including the delightful lists of Award of Merit and Honorable Mention winners.

(*Members can download a free copy of the handbook from the* <u>Portal Store</u>.) It is required to have. This book contains all the DO'S and DO NOT'S of being an exhibition judge. Every club member should have one because it explains in detail all the job descriptions for having an accredited daylily show.

If you need Exhibition Judge's Clinic II or Clinic III, these will be offered at the Region 6 Meeting hosted by the Daylily Growers of Dallas in Terrell, TX, on May 31, 2024. If you will be attending either of these Clinics, please make sure to check the appropriate box on the registration form. You will pay at the time of the Clinic. Please bring CASH. Make sure your ADS dues are always up to date.

If you are not a judge, please consider being one! If you have been a Senior exhibition judge for at least two years, please consider becoming an instructor.

Region 6 currently has 17 active judges and only three active instructors.

Clinics I and III are also offered online. Please email Debbie Smith at <u>debdahlsmith@hughes.net</u> for more information on when these clinics will be available.

If there are any junior judges who need help finding a place to judge, please feel free to contact me so that I can help.

Enjoy the beautiful gardens that you will encounter this year. Really look at the daylilies. Notice the form, texture, colors, sizes, branching, and bud count.






### For Better Garden Photos... Compose and Crop! By Mike Peppers

Advancements in phone and digital cameras have taken most of the guesswork out of amateur garden photography as it relates to technology. Brilliant, crisp, high-resolution photos are now standard and easily achievable. But a

gorgeous shot of a gorgeous daylily or other plant is about more than just the megapixels. There is art to the composition of a great photo. Many of our club flower shows now include competitive photography sections. Good judges will be looking at the composition of the shot more than its technical brilliance. Two critical elements are placement and perspective.

A common go-to shot is to have the subject dead center in the lens. That's appropriate sometimes; however, it's predictable and can get boring when your entire photo gallery looks like a page from a plant catalog. Varying the placement of your subject in the shot will provide visual diversity and excitement to the viewer. It will be more impressive to photography judges, too. A practice to consider is using the "Rule of Thirds." Most phone cameras even have the ability to turn on faint grid lines on the camera to assist with this. The concept is to place the main subject in one of the "thirds" areas of the photo field. This assumes there is visually attractive material in the other areas of the shot that will complement the main subject. But that's where the photographer's artistic eye must kick in.

Another consideration is to have an appropriate perspective of the main subject. A common problem in photography is that the shot is taken from such a distance that it includes too many things for the viewer's eye to absorb. It may not

be clear where they should be looking. This can be addressed with effective cropping. Again, most phones have great abilities in the "edit" mode. You usually want to check the option to retain the original shot's ratio. Then, zoom in on the image to place the focus on the subject. Remove distracting or non-important elements of the shot. You can also use this opportunity to adjust placement considering the Rule of Thirds.

Whether you're vying for a win in the next photography contest or simply want some added interest in your personal photo gallery, enhancing your skills and abilities for photo composition will serve you well. Our daylily blooms and garden plants are with us for far too short a period of time. Our photos of them, however, can now endure literally forever. Let's make those shots the absolute best they can be!



### This page sponsored by Tracey Stewart Will the Real Jean Dorrell Please Stand Up? by Tracey Stewart

In 2006, we purchased a property in rural southeast Texas in the tiny town of Colmesneil. The real estate listing advertised the features of the house and acreage, noting that the property was "heavily landscaped." Long story short, we became the owner of an established daylily farm.

The farm belonged to Jean and her husband Tommy Dorrell. Jean grew up in Colmesneil, a town of less than 600 people; however, the Dorrells lived in Orange, Texas where they worked and raised a family. It wasn't until she and Tommy retired that they moved back to Colmesneil in 1988, on old family land. It also just so happened that a regionally known daylily hybridizer named J.L. Cruse lived about a mile down the road.

J.L.'s heyday as a hybridizer was during the 70s, 80s and very early 90s till his death in 1994. He raised cattle and maintained a daylily farm. He registered his first daylilies in 1969: *H.* 'Lady Susan', *H.* 'Pink Moonlight' and *H.* 'Sea of Tranquility'. (Sadly, none of those cultivars have pictures associated with them in the ADS

database.) He later became better known for his cultivars whose names had "Gypsy" or "Little Gypsy" in the prefix. According to the database, he eventually registered or co-registered 367 cultivars.

At some point, Jean and J.L. became good friends and Jean got bitten by the "daylily bug." J.L. mentored her in all aspects of daylily care and culture, eventually corregistering a cultivar in her name, *H.* 'Jean Dorrell' in 1992. (As before, regrettably the cultivar *H.* 'Jean Dorrell' did not have a picture entered into the database.)

As J.L. neared his time of passing, he told Jean that she could dig up and take every daylily he had. So, she did, and thereby Flower Branch Gardens was established by the early 1990s. In fact, after J.L.'s death, she bought the charming 140-year-old white frame house that he had lived in, and had it moved to her property, in which she and Tommy then resided.

Jean's daylily farm prospered and grew under her care. She joined the American Hemerocallis Society in 1994. She eventually became known in the area as the "daylily lady," even garnering a large write-up in the local newspaper. But she didn't just grow daylilies. She also grew vegetables as well as many other kinds of flowers. She landscaped the entire property in azaleas, camelias, daffodils, iris, amaryllis, daisies, confederate roses, herbs and more. Her son-in-law tried to set up a website for her, but Jean refused. She hated computers, preferring real, in-person visits with other gardeners.

Time passed and eventually Tommy became ill and needed more bedside care. They made the painful decision to sell the farm and move back to Orange, where they would have additional help from friends and family. So, in 2006, I answered the ad and bought Flower Branch Gardens from Jean and Tommy. I was thrilled, as I had often thought of owning a nursery, and Jean was thrilled to know that someone was going to keep the daylily farm going. It was a win-win situation for both of us!

I loved the daylily farm from the beginning. The biggest challenge for me, however, when I inherited all the daylilies, was that none of them were labeled. Jean knew them and their location all by memory! Many years later, I learned that the daylily 'Jean Dorrell' was still somewhere on the property, but I had no way of knowing for sure. J.L. Cruse's vague description, a "rose pink bitone," fit dozens of other unlabeled daylilies. So, I tucked it away in the back of my mind.

Time marched on. Jean passed away at the age of 94 on January 22, 2024. My husband and I attended her funeral. The family had photos displayed on a table. And lo and behold, there was a picture of 'Jean Dorell' and another one of Jean posing with 'Jean Dorrell'. The day-lily nerd in me was so excited! Her daughter, Tommye

Jean Johnson, graciously gave me permission to submit it to the ADS for the database. Isn't it wondrous how 32 years later, at the occasion of Jean's passing, that the identity of her namesake was finally revealed? If that isn't a wink from Jean as she passed into the arms of her Savior, I don't know what is. Rest in peace, Jean. You're always in my heart.



### The Care and Feeding of Daylilies—101 (A Beginner's Guide) By Dan Cathey

Daylilies are among my favorite plants. For the most part, they are easy, but there are certain things you can do to help your daylilies prosper.



H. 'Boundary Born', (Salter, 2020)

**Planting**: Plant in spring or fall. Don't plant daylilies when the weather is very hot, or you are setting yourself up for failure. Because of their fibrous roots and thickened spindles for water storage, newly planted daylilies are very susceptible to root rot under hot conditions. If you simply "must" buy a daylily when they are blooming-*and I wouldn't know anything about that*-plant them in a large container and place them in dappled shade where you will keep them watered. In the cool shade, they will grow throughout summer and be ready to place in the ground in fall. If you can't do this, go ahead and plant your daylilies in the garden, but be sure to shade

them (one time, I even put an old lawn chair over a daylily to provide a little bit of shade). For bareroot daylilies, spread daylily roots over a mound of soil in the hole. Make sure to place soil up underneath the daylily crown (never cover the crown) and water thor-

oughly, you don't want air pockets when winter comes calling.

•Feed: Daylilies respond to a high-nitrogen fertilizer and will deliver more blooms. I bet that surprises you. A larger clump ensures better and larger blooms. Nitrogen

fertilizer helps create a larger clump. I have mentioned this before, but I learned from hybridizer Dan Trimmer years ago that since daylilies are a monocot (2 seed leaves) plant, which is basically grass, you can use the same type of fertilizer as you would use on your lawn,

sure it isn't "Weed and Feed"! I've used different organic fertilizers, from composted chicken manure to Milorganite®. Alfalfa -based fertilizers, such as HuMore®, which is alfalfa and manure, can

like a 15-5-10. Just be

work well. Another good choice is Back to Nature®, but almost any brand will suffice. Daylilies will respond to all of these, and I change them up from year to year to maintain balance. I also give them a year off now and then. You should also check your soil every few years with a soil test to make sure your garden is-

n't out of balance or overfertilized. Phosphorus is very stable and can literally build up in the soil to toxic levels.

•Mulch: I use shredded oak leaves as mulch. You can apply this in the Fall or hold it over till early Spring, but I



over till early Spring, but I (internet photo) normally store it until the soil starts to warm up. Occa-

sionally, I also lay shredded cypress mulch, but only occasionally when appearance really counts, but hey, leaves are basically free.

•Water: Daylilies have roots that hold water, and ditch lilies seem to grow all by themselves. However, if you'll notice, ditch lilies grow in ditches where water runs freely. They appreciate a little extra water and good drainage.





H'Pink Peppermint' (Joiner-J, 1995)

•Good drainage: Daylilies will tolerate some clay,

but they grow best in conditions where they have decent drainage. Otherwise, they may rot.

•Maintenance: Deadhead regularly. Although it isn't a requirement, doing so makes for a neater appearance, allows new flowers



to open, and keeps scapes from falling over due to weight. I try to deadhead daily. After the daylilies bloom, I cut off scapes–i.e., stems. Some people don't and let their daylilies finish out the cycle. However, I think they can be unsightly, so I remove them. Whichever you choose, do remove any seedpods unless you're trying to hybridize. Seedpods take energy from the mother plant.

Like all perennials, expect daylilies to take three years or more to realize their potential. They will probably bloom in the second year, but not at the rate and form they will achieve in future summers. Give them time.



H'Silly Goose' (Douglas-H, 2019)

These are all things that I do to help ensure daylily success. Daylilies bring a lot of joy to my garden. After all, I can't be the only one who is daylily mad, can I?

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





microbiome. She recommends removing foliage that has become mushy and prone to rot but leave crispy brown stems and leaves until later in the season. Cover plant crowns with mulch to protect against any new freezes. We are lucky to have Sherri as our host and as our local garden expert.
