To help with this, about 2 to 4 weeks before the deadline, I type up a reminder email and ask our Region 6 Webmaster, Ray Houston, to forward it to all our Region 6 Members. This email includes requests for officer and club reports, as well as for articles and photos. If I don't hear from officers or club reporters by the deadline, I will send a personal message to see if I should save space and request that the information be sent within two days. I often hear the same response: "I didn't know when the deadline was." In at least one case, after suggesting they check their spam folder, they found Ray's email there. Many email programs mark bulk emails as "spam" and block them. If you aren't receiving any emails from Ray Houston, please check your spam folder and mark his email address, krhouston60@att. net, as safe. This will ensure you receive important updates regarding Regional and ADS news, so it's vital to stay informed.

Every time I request information for the newsletter, I am reminded of the incredible dedication and passion that each of you brings to our Region. Your reports and photos are not just contributions; they are a reflection of your love for what we do. I ask that reports be sent as Word documents or in the body of an email. This is not always followed, and it complicates my work—trying to make things fit, retyping PDFs, or exchanging emails to get what I need. Photos should be sent as taken, not cropped or resized, which usually ensures they are at least 1 MB in size and 300 dpi. It is also important to send them as attachments, not embedded in the email. Sometimes these files are quite large, so multiple emails may be needed to get them all to me. This will help ensure that the newsletter maintains a professional look and that the photos are of high quality when printed. I sincerely appreciate everything you send, and I enjoy putting the newsletters together. Your contributions are invaluable, and I am deeply grateful for your efforts. Please help me out by submitting your reports and photos in the requested format and by the deadline. If you are an officer or club reporter, please add these deadlines to your calendar:

ADS Region 6 Co-Publicity Chairs Tim Closs and Brant Mauthe



The Region 6 Popularity Poll results for 2025 are in, and we're happy to announce that the number of Region 6 members who returned ballots has increased slightly from 53 voters in 2024 to 56 in 2025. This upward trend in participation is due to our collective dedication and interest in our daylily region. For a recent historical analysis of the participation numbers for the Popularity Poll, you can refer to the Publicity Report in the Fall 2023 newsletter. We believe that part of the decline in participation is related to the American Daylily Society (ADS) decision to drop the annual poll at the national level, and we continue to see

the effects of that decision in our Regional poll. Your Region 6 Executive Committee addressed the declining participation numbers by opening the Pop Poll to all Region 6 members and removing the restriction that voting members had to be ADS members. In addition, based on survey data, we kept a similar format. We will continue to search for ways to increase participation and welcome all ideas.

Below are the results of the 2025 Region 6 Popularity Poll showing the top ten (10) rankings and those cultivars that tied with the same number of votes.

Club Participation

This year, we want to give a special shoutout to the Cypress Creek Daylily Club and the Daylily Growers of Dallas. These two clubs have shown exceptional dedication and enthusiasm, with Cypress Creek leading the pack with 18 club members who voted, followed closely by Dallas with 9. Your active participation strengthens our Region's Pop Poll, and we thank you for your efforts in getting out the vote!

Crunching the Numbers

We continue to revise the number of cultivars listed on the Region 6 Pop Poll to fewer than 55 to help reduce option overload. We dropped cultivars that received either zero or one vote and added new cultivars from YOUR write-in suggestions. The write-in cultivar section of the ballot offers the most significant opportunity for your voice to be heard. It doesn't take many votes to get added to the ballot for the following year. If you have a favorite cultivar not on the list, be sure to write it in!

Summary

In our 2024 Poll report, we listed four ideas to help increase participation. We believe that three of those four ideas helped in stabilizing our participation numbers. Brant and I will do a better job of implementing the fourth, the establishment of a direct Pop Poll liaison in each club. We believe the ADS Region 6 Popularity

Poll continues to help guide gardeners and newcomers to the Texas/New Mexico Region toward tried-and-true daylily cultivars that perform well and have proven they can flourish in our diverse soil and climatic zones. As always, we are open to any suggestions to help improve the Region 6 Popularity Poll and encourage you to contact us to discuss your concerns. Your feedback is invaluable in shaping the future of the Region's Pop Poll.

Since most of our clubs host Spring Daylily Shows, I know all clubs would qualify for at least the 50% level, because that is a requirement for having an accredited Daylily Show. 

This last year has been a good one, with better results from growing taller, large and small, daylilies. I have had a lot of pretty ones over the last few years that either die with the July-August heat or else have such short scapes at first bloom that they can't get out of the leaves. Maybe that is the late winter hard freezes, but it is very annoying.


My best results lately have been with *H*. 'Wishy Washy' and H. 'Viva Glam Girl' second to third generation seedlings (Tetraploid), H. 'Little Lemon Twist' first and second generation seedlings (Diploid), and H. 'Heavenly Orange Scorcher' x H. 'Renaissance Revival' second to third generation seedlings (Tetraploid). I am really tired of rust and late-summer instant death affecting my named daylilies and seedlings, so I have been shovelpruning all of those out and their parents, if they have parts that live. It really makes my gardening easier, and the results are consistently better.

One of the only ones I still have is *H*. **'Yellow Monkey'** (Gossard, James 2007 Tet), along with a couple of its seedlings. Most of the mother clump and all but 3 of the 30+ seedlings died in the heat. Great one day, and mostly dead the next with no rot smell. Just a freshcooked look, and they smell like a new baked potato. Crazy, but I find that half to two-thirds of daylilies from cooler, more moderate locations do this. I have betterthan-average results with Gossard's introductions, so I will give it one more year. I am thankful for the local hybridizers who are working to grow hardier selections that would be better to grow and share with visitors to our clubs. It is a great help when we can grow a pretty garden without having to replace plants regularly.

Remembering Our Daylily Friends

Harvey Adolf Shimek

November 24, 1938-October 22, 2025

Harvey Adolf Shimek was born November 24, 1938, in Fayette County, Texas, the son of Frederick Shimek and Frances (Kobza) Shimek.

Harvey & Lynn Nell Middlebrooks were married on June 3, 1977. They started collecting

daylilies in 1979 for their garden in Alvin, Texas, which they named "Shimiek's Gardens."

In 1986, Harvey and Nell joined *Brazosport Daylily Society*. Their garden was on tour for the 1987 Region 6 Meeting, and their garden has been one of the Region 6 tour gardens for many of the annual Region 6 Meetings since then.

Harvey was always very busy with his large daylily gardens and called himself the "Hoe Man", as he usually had a hoe in his hand when in the gardens.

My wife, Mary, and I became close friends with the Shimeks and shared rooms with them at many Regional Meetings and National Conventions. They took us on many trips into Louisiana to visit the daylily gardens of Ken Durio, Opelousas; Lucille Guidry, Abbeville; and Elsie Spalding, Iowa. The further we got into Louisiana, Harvey became more Cajun and we had difficulty understanding him when he spoke.

In 1996, Harvey and Nell and were instrumental in forming the *Lone Star Daylily Society* in Alvin, Texas. They have been active members of the club ever since.

The Shimek's were AHS Senior Exhibition Judges and judged daylily shows all over the United States and even in South America.

In 1991, the Shimek garden was named as an official **AHS Display Garden**. In 2016, they dropped their garden from the Display Garden designation.

Harvey was an experienced flower arranger and won the **AHS Tricolor Award** in 1999.

Harvey passed away October 22, 2025 at the age of 86.

We're Getting Too Old for This

hen you are a daylily holic, it's almost impossible not to continue to add to your inventory. With all the new patterns, shapes, and sizes, you just have to have some of the latest and greatest. Then you look at yourself in the mirror and see that you aren't getting any younger, and you should have started all of this downsizing years ago. OK, you'll begin to cut back and downsize. After all, you don't know how much longer you're going to be able to keep doing this.

We're there. We've been there for about 3 years. Every year, we talk about downsizing and cutting back on making crosses or buying seeds. Sounds good, but there's always a new pretty face. We think, if we get this pretty face, we can do crosses with it for next year. And so it goes.

Knowing that this day was coming, over the past five years, we've gotten the garden in some semblance of order, which has helped both of us. We've divided the garden into sections and laid down weed mat between the sections. This cut down on the weeding and mowing, which Doug had to do.

Some of the sections are specific: one just for diploids, one for doubles, and one for UF's. The other three sections are mostly tetraploids with a mix of named varieties and seedlings we are looking to possibly register. Each section has a name. In section "C", we have started an area that is mostly broken color varieties,

some named and some seedlings. This helps when we are hybridizing. If all the diploids are in one section, we don't have to worry about crossing those with a tetraploid and so forth. In the doubles and UF sections, they are planted with diploids in a section and the tetraploids across the aisle. They are also in alphabetical order. It helps to find them when we've sold one. It also helps when hybridizing.



Section A is mostly named plants with some seedlings mixed in.



Section B is all diploids.

I also alphabetize our seed crosses, and then they are given a number. All of the diploids are put together, tetraploids, doubles, etc. This helps us identify them when they are in the greenhouse and then in the garden. Having started this system several years ago, it also helps

when it comes to downsizing. If we still have something from 2020 or earlier, and they are still in pots, it's easier to cull these. We can't keep every pretty face, and the older I get, the easier it is to cull.

Last year, we only had enough seeds that we either crossed or that we purchased, which did not exceed the capacity of the greenhouse about 800 one-gallon trade pots. In years past, we've had twice or three times that much. This year, we have enough to fill maybe three boxes (which hold about 68 one-gallon pots) in the greenhouse. That's about one-third of what we've done in the past. Not all of those will make it to maturity. We have discovered that the most fatalities occur in seedling form northern latitudes, mostly from crown rot. There are always some that die during the winter.

I don't know how much longer we will be able to do this. I'm 77 and Doug is 83. While we both still work in the garden, we've both slowed down some. Can't do as much as we used to be able to do, especially in the summer months. We'll continue doing crosses next year, but hopefully, it will be less than what we did this year. We want to decrease the number of plants we have by at least half in the next year or two. Maybe there won't be any more pretty faces we have to have in the future, just the ones we make.



CANDIED PECANSBy Diana Medrano

Ingredients:

3 egg whites

1 cup of sugar or alternative sugar (stevia)

1 tsp vanilla

1 stick of butter

1 pound of pecan halves

To make these delicious treats, start by beating the egg whites until stiff. Then, mix the sugar and vanilla together and add the pecans, stirring to coat them evenly. Next, melt the butter and pour it onto a large cookie tray. Add the coated pecans to the tray, spreading them out evenly. There's no need to stir. Place the pecans in the oven for 10 minutes at 325 degrees. After 10 minutes, take them out, stir the pecans, and return them to the oven for another 10 minutes. Repeat this process for a total of 40 minutes of cooking time, stirring every 10 minutes. Once they're done, let the pecans cool, then store them in an airtight container and enjoy.

I've done 2 pounds of pecans at a time (doubling the recipe), but add an additional 10 minutes (for a total of 50 minutes).

To Be or Not To Be...

That is the Fall Regional Symposium quandary that came up at the recent Fall Region 6 Meeting sponsored by the Johnson County Iris and Daylily Society.

During the business meeting, when RP David Freshour reported the actions of the Board Meeting held before the Region 6 Meeting, he indicated, among other topics, that the subject of Fall Regional Meetings was one of the items discussed. Here is the key element David was referring to: ADS rules require an annual Meeting of the Regional membership, and at such a Meeting, at least 5% of the Region's membership must be present. Historically, to achieve our Region's compliance with ADS rules, we have held an annual Spring or Fall Regional Meeting under the sponsorship of one of the Region's member clubs. David's report on this part of the board's discussions seem to stir up some controversy among those attending.

The majority of Regional Meetings in the past have been held in the Spring.

Spring meetings offer tours of the sponsor club's area gardens along with the other agenda requirements. Spring garden tours meet one of the requirements for judges' training, both exhibition and garden judging, daylilies in bloom. While this requirement can be met *Daylilies of the Southwest*-Newsletter of ADS Region 6

on a case-by-case basis by making special arrangements with instructors and garden owners, Spring Regional Meetings are a simpler approach. Garden tours also offer members the opportunity to view many cultivars in various settings, up close and personal, something that would be difficult to duplicate on one's own.

The ever-increasing costs of securing buses for garden tours, coupled with the need for volunteers to open their private gardens, have become a genuine concern. Not only is the sponsor club faced with a significant up-front financial commitment, but the cost to attendees also increases accordingly. Spring Regionals are usually two-day events, which translates to at least two and possibly three nights in a hotel. Spring Regionals require those attending to be absent from their own gardens at peak bloom as well. With garden tours come the expense of enough buses to accommodate all the attendees, portapotties, and lunches on the road, along with hours spent on buses traveling to and from gardens.

While Fall Meetings may not meet the bloom requirements, they do offer significant advantages. They minimize the cost and planning requirements for such Meetings, making sponsorship much more feasible for the clubs and less expensive for attendees. This balance of cost and benefit is an essential factor to consider when deciding on the timing of our Regional Meetings.

These are some of the considerations brought up by your board of directors at the Meeting in Cleburne, TX, and by members. Neither the board nor this article makes specific recommendations for Spring vs. Fall; the intention is to ensure that Regional Meetings are within reach for Regional clubs and members going forward. There is no requirement at the national ADS or the Region 6 level for when the Meeting is to be held. The who, what, when, where, and how is strictly up to the sponsor club.

At this time, we don't have a meeting scheduled for 2026. Please talk to your club about stepping up to host a meeting next year.






